

#### Merced National Wildlife Refuge- Merced Unit 2023 Floodup Schedule







#### **Kern NWR Update**

Kern NWR is receiving a full water allocation of 25,000 acre-feet.

The refuge began flooding in late July and is expecting to have its waterfowl opener in line with the Southern San Joaquin Zone.

The refuge has experienced some flood-up delays due to a water project offrefuge that is limiting water deliveries.

Kern NWR is projecting to have all wetlands flooded by the end of winter, as long as there are no further water delivery delays or infrastructure failures.

Kern NWR won't be posting hunt results on the refuge website due to staff shortages and policy compliance. Hunt results can be found online at the CDFW website or a paper copy at the check station.

## Trailered Boat Access




#### 2023 Flooding





Subsidence has been a contributing factor in difficulty of transporting James Bypass flood flows through the MWA






#### GENERAL COMMENTS

- Water supply is 100% Level 2 for State wildlife areas in the San Joaquin Valley.
- The Los Banos and North Grasslands Wildlife Areas benefitted from new state funds for fire
  resiliency and emergency drought funds. The funding enabled the purchase of a new discing
  tractor, 4 new discs, 3 new mowers and a motor grader. New equipment translates to less down
  time due to breakdown and more time developing productive habitat.
- It was quite a year, that started with reduced quotas due to a third year of drought and a greatly
  reduced water supply. Then the floods came closing several areas and hunt locations for weeks
  due too much water! Through all these challenges our hunters remained patient and adapted to
  ever changing conditions. We would like to thank all of you for your willingness to be flexible
  and overcome the many ups and downs of last year and the past few years.
- Recruiting and retaining qualified, passionate people to do the work on these wildlife area
  continues to be a challenge, not unlike many other industries. Opportunities for better wages
  with other government resource management agencies, the private sector, and even better
  paying opportunities outside the wildlife areas in CDFW often make hiring and retaining staff
  difficult. I would like to take a moment to publicly thank our staff here at Los Banos and North
  Grasslands for their tireless dedication and commitment to these areas and the highly skilled
  work they do.



### LOS BANOS WA HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES 2022/2023

- Several large-scale infrastructure management actions took place or are in the works on Los Banos WA. The installation of a new pipe at the Boundary Drain crossing at Parking Lot 3. Three miles of delivery ditches were excavated. Field 33 and Field 9 were leveled, and the swales were reshaped. Our thanks to CWA and DU for managing those projects.
- 105 acres of safflower were planted and mowed for dove hunting and 250 additional acres of mature wheat was mowed. A 100 hunter limited reservation hunt with a fill-in lottery draw will happen tomorrow and Friday Current dove numbers are encouraging.
- 1600 acres of seasonal wetlands were irrigated of which approx. 250 acres of watergrass was reseeded.
- Hunter quotas will be up from previous seasons on the opener. We will still
  have a small amount of stage flooding of some of the area. Full quotas
  should be in effect in early December.



# VOLTA WA HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES 2022/2023

- Wetland Acreage should be 100% of a normal year and flooded like the previous years.
- Once again water fluctuations throughout the summer in Field 10 never allowed the area to dry up sufficiently to allow emergent vegetation control. We are working with several entities to see if we can develop a project to re-establish and deepen the main channel and several side channels to increase the overall holding capacity in Field 10. Once the old channels are excavated it will allow down stream irrigations with those channels keeping water off the shallow edges of Field 10 so work can be done throughout the summer.
- This spring the Volta Check station had several attempts to break into it. New window covers and rollup doors on the front windows were installed. The cost was approx.\$6,000.00 and several days of staff time to secure it.





- Staff reseeded watergrass in ponds 8, 13, and 17. These ponds may be difficult to wade in due to the heavy discing.









### CHINA ISLAND UNIT NORTH GRASSLANDS WA HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES 2022/2023

- China Island experience record flooding both for elevation of the flood water as well as the duration. The flooding did not allow for staff to move any heavy equipment into the uplands to do our spring planting or any significant wetland management due to a very high-water table.
- The good news is that no major damage occurred to the flood control levees or internal levees. However, the flood plain is full of cocklebur and sunflower and will be difficult to get around in. Staff plans to mow or disc areas dry enough to get into later this fall.
- China Island will have a delayed opener and will be open to hunting on opening weekend of pheasant season (November 11th).
- Watergrass Fields 5 and 8 received several irrigations and are looking good.






### GADWALL UNIT NORTH GRASSLANDS WA HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES 2022/2023

- Seven hundred and ninety acres of swamp timothy was irrigated this year.
- All swales were reshaped and returned to grade. CWA was the project manager, and the work will greatly improve our water efficiency and ability to do rapid irrigations.
- The area received water starting on August 14 in field 10.
   This is much earlier than last season. The area will be flooded for opening day with a full hunter quota.
- \* Gadwall Zone F will not open until the first week of December.





































Hi Sean. Here are question/comments for today's webinar.

- -With liberal goose limits, can more be done at NSJV Wildlife areas to provide habitat for attracting geese and providing quality hunting opportunities. Is it possible to improve closed zones to attract more geese, and/or disking/planting of open fields for goose hunting, maybe put in goose pits where appropriate; i.e., Merced Refuge?
- -Please continue to educate hunters to refrain from skybusting, and provide more periodic inspection of hunters in the field on shell limits in possession. Announcing this over the speakers at the check station is appreciated.
- -There are still alot of hunters who do not know duck species, so important to provide posters or brochures at check stations for hunter education.

Thanks for the update on the meeting. My main question has to do with the Mendota Slough and whether or not we are going to be able to hunt out of boats this year. Has the water hyacinth been eradicated and if not, why not?

That's it from me. Thanks for all you do for us hunters!!

#### Sean

Well this gets a little more explanatory than is necessary but I wanted to give some background on this suggestion and then expound on the reasoning behind the concept.

#### #1 Increase the number of hunters participating by increasing the number of Reservations

- •It seems like most of the people that I have talked to about duckhunting over the years are not willing to go to the refuge if they don't have a reservation and they don't want to drive out and apply for a lottery number the night before and then wait around or go home and look online later to see if they're going to go hunting the next day.
- •A few that really want to go decide to not enter a lottery and just show up in the morning and hope to get in somewhere but this is not the ideal way for them to go.
- •This obviously does not include the hard-core hunter like me and ones I hunt with that don't have a reservation but are willing to go out and sleep in their truck or in a trailer the night before to get in a lottery and hope for somewhere to hunt.
  •But most people that I talk to you either don't go unless they get a reservation or they get frustrated because they have sent in 100 applications for reservations and have only gotten a couple all year. We would all agree that the number of applications for Reservations has increased dramatically over the last 10 years.
- •If we could ever increase the numbers of reservations for each area except for the opening and closing weekend to 75% of capacity instead of 50% that would give a lot more people a chance at a reservation somewhere and they would be more likely to go. Especially this year because we should have more water and therefore should have the normal number of hunters to be able to get into each refuge and therefore hunters would have increased odds to get a reservation. This should not overload the reservation system at each refuge, because normally at least a number of the reservations don't show up because people have multiple areas that they have sent in for and usually go to their favorite area if they get a reservation for it. I think you would agree that this would increase the number of hunters participating and that is ideally one of the goals of the CDFW.
- •So if CDFW would increase the number of reservations, except for open and closing weekend, this would increase the participation exponentially for hunters utilizing the refuge system. I believe this would have a dramatic effect upon the member of hunters getting involved with Duckhunting, which would be good for The Hunting community and CDFW

### #2 Mailing reservations to applicants

One more point that I would like to make is that most hunters check their reservations on the day they come out online and then print out a copy for themselves and therefore do not need the CDFW to mail them a copy of the reservation. There could be a place on the reservation website for people to opt out of receiving a mailed copy if they didn't need one and that would save the CDFW a lot of expense!!

Hi Sean,

Would like to send some questions comments ahead of time to hopefully be included in meeting.

My questions/comments all center around the Mendota WLA and the mismanagement of it. This refuge could be the crown jewel of the state instead it is much like the wild wild west.

Some topics for discussion. 1) Dove hunting food plots that say they have been planted. Problem is they have not been planted in over 10 years!! They are all weeds that have been mowed days before the season. 2) Many refuges post water maps for duck hunting and the schedule for which ponds will be flooded. This is very valuable information for hunters. Mendota has only done this once, years ago. 3) The duck hunting part of Mendota is so disorganized. Once you leave the check stand it is a race to get to your spot. I would like to use Los Banos as an example. Each parking lot there is regulate for the amount of hunters it can handle to avoid overcrowding. There are assigned ponds where groups of hunters can set up away from crowds. There are blinds where groups can set up without anyone crowding in on them. At Mendota there is none of this. Parking lots are overcrowded. Often times overflowing onto the road creating hazardous conditions. Fights break out in ponds over competition for the Prime spot. I have seen cars that were driving so fast to get to their spot that they actually lost control and went into the pond!! It is madness. And the refuge manager hates duck hunters!! Something needs to change here.

I am glad to hear about this meeting. I understand that many refuges will be discussed and there might not be time to talk about everything. Mendota is very important to me. I have hunted here for over 35 years. If there is not enough time to discuss Mendota I would love the opportunity to talk to you. I would be available anytime.
