

Salmonids in the Classroom Teacher Workshops

Salmonids in the Classroom is a project-based program for students that can be used in pre-K through college level. Students raise salmon or trout from eggs to small fish in their classrooms and then release the fish into the wild. The goal of this program is for the students to learn to be informed stewards of the watersheds in which they live. The program correlates with numerous CDE Common Core and NGSS standards.

To start participating in the program, teachers must attend a two-part online workshop and includes some homework. Aquatic Project WILD training is included.

The workshops are free. The workshops listed here are intended for teachers who will have their field trip in one of the following counties: Fresno, Kern, Kings, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Monterey, San Benito, San Luis Obispo, Stanislaus, Tulare, or Tuolumne.
