Add Section 700.1 Title 14, California Code of Regulations Re: Free Hunting Days

ECONOMIC IMPACT STATEMENT

ECONOMIC IMPACT

This Emergency action does not require a full economic impact assessment; only fiscal impacts must be evaluated (California Government Code Section 11346.1). However, if this regulatory change is successful in attracting more people to hunting, it could potentially have a positive economic impact on businesses that rely on revenue from hunters, such as sporting goods stores, hunting guides, and bird hunting clubs.

Information on the fiscal impact is provided below.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

A. FISCAL EFFECT ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Answer: 5. No fiscal impact. No nondiscretionary costs, or savings are anticipated for local agencies as a result of this regulation change.

B. FISCAL EFFECT ON STATE GOVERNMENT

Answer: 1. Additional expenditures in the current State Fiscal Year. (Approximate)

\$2,400

1.a. Absorb these additional costs within existing budgets and resources.

First year Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) implementation costs are estimated to be \$2,400 to contract for programing changes to the Automated Licensing Data System (ALDS) to prevent hunters from using the registration for more than one license year. No ongoing nondiscretionary costs, or savings are anticipated for other State agencies as a result of this regulation change.

The Department anticipates redirecting approximately 8-12 hours of staff time to create, set up, and test two new items: the Free Hunting Day registration and the Free Hunting Day wild pig tag. In the second year, the Department anticipates redirecting 8-12 hours of staff time to create, set up, and test the Free Hunting Day wild pig validation implemented in 2024 by SB 856 (2022). Continued maintenance would also be required every year, requiring the Department to redirect up to 8-10 hours of staff time annually.

This bill could provide a positive fiscal impact in future years for the Department if new hunters entering the field during a free hunting day take up the activity of hunting and purchase annual hunting licenses in the future. However, participating in a free hunting day may not provide enough incentive to attract new hunters because the prerequisite to participate in a free hunting day requires a hunter to invest approximately 8-10 hours of time in a hunter education course and pay a fee for the course.

C. FISCAL EFFECT ON FEDERAL FUNDING OF STATE PROGRAMS

Answer: 3. No fiscal impact exists. This regulation does not affect any federally funded State agency or program.
