

Funding Survey Results

- 68 Respondents
- Identified
 - 17 private foundation or organizational funders
 - 40 governmental funders
 - 39 funding sources that could be modified
 - 33 funding sources that could be used to motivate adaptation action
 - 13 potential new sources of funding

What was missing?

- Corporate donors (particularly insurance industry)
- State/local funding sources outside of California

How Adaptation is Funded

- Federal government grants
- Private foundations and organizations
- State or local funding sources
- Budget allocations

The Issue

- Perceived need is increasing
- New funding sources are not keeping pace
- Sequester threatens many of the funding sources currently being tapped for adaptation

Our Options

- Wait for leadership at the federal/state levels
- Hope communities will find funding locally
- Influence the way in which existing funding is spent
- Advocate for new funding sources
